[Kenneth H Mostyn - Father of the Guild*](#)

It is with deep sadness that we advise members of the death of Kenneth Mostyn (CLS 1924-34), Father of the Guild, on 13th December 2003 at the age of 88. The Guild sends its condolences to his widow Ella, his son Peter and all the family.

Kenneth joined the HAC in 1938, became a Captain in the RASC and saw WW2 action in the European theatre. After 4 years in Beal's Ltd he bought and ran a successful hotel business in Blackpool until eventually retiring and moving back to London where he lived in Winchmore Hill until his death. By his first wife, Irma, he had a son Peter (CLS 1954-64). Kenneth married his second wife, Ella Brown, in August 2003. Ella had looked after him for many years.

Kenneth joined the Baker's Company as a Liveryman in 1937 and served as Master from November 1972. A distinguished Freemason (Baker's Company and John Carpenter Lodges) he was made an Officer of the United Grand Lodge. In 1973 he met with 3 other Old Citizens (all now deceased) Jack Diamond, a pre-war Master of the Blacksmith's Company, Bill Grain, a Past Master of the Scriveners Company, and one of the Baldrey brothers, to discuss collecting together a group of Liverymen to rekindle their interest in the CLS, the history, present, and future of the City and, at the same time help other OC's to become Freemen. Jack Diamond, was elected Chairman of the "O.C. Liverymen". Kenneth became Chairman in 1975, a position he held for the next 14 years during which time membership of the group had grown to over 250. His knowledge of Livery Companies and the City was second to none. Besides encouraging OC's to become Freemen, he also introduced a significant number of candidates for the Livery, some of whom today sit on the Court of their Companies. In 1999 O.C Liverymen became the Guild of Scholars and, in recognition of his commitment and dedication as Chairman of OCL he was unanimously elected as **Father of the Guild**, an honour he was both delighted and proud to accept.

Kenneth was a kindly, courteous and good-humoured man and a good friend who loved his City and the School, we had much to be grateful to him for, and he will be greatly missed by all of us who are left to carry on his work.

Candidates & Apprentices

As you will know, the Guild runs an Apprenticeship scheme to encourage pupils at the 3 schools to get to know the City better and progress to becoming Freeman; younger pupils can join in as 'Candidates' before becoming Apprentices. Please let any pupils you may be in contact with know about the scheme. If you are a Freeman who is not a Liveryman we need your help as a Master to an Apprentice. (The duty is not onerous and is a great way of keeping in touch with the boys & girls).

If you are a young man or woman not living in London this is a great way of maintaining your links with the City for a very modest sum (about £30 total compared to £100s - £1000s to become - and remain - a Liveryman). Should you eventually return to London it provides an immediate gateway to the social & 'networking' possibilities of the

Guilds and Livery Companies. (...And don't be put off by the arcane language). Worth investigating, it could represent an excellent investment for the future.

Being Charitable with Gordon Brown

It is now possible to nominate The Guild of Scholars Charitable Trust to receive part (or all!) of any tax repayment (e.g. of over-paid tax) you may be entitled to in future from the taxman. The trust then gets the nominated amount PLUS 28% from Gordon. ALL you have to do on your next (& subsequent) tax returns is nominate the amount & quote the Trust's unique code number (PAM43WG) - which you will also find on the Inland Revenue's website from April 2004; the taxman does the rest. It will possible to donate anonymously if desired.

This scheme is quite separate from the existing Gift Aid scheme, it does not replace it (and you can still make donations to the Trust by standing order or cheque).

City of London School for Girls, (Off Fore St.), Barbican, London, EC2Y 8BB

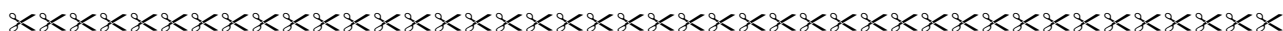
FRIDAY 19TH MARCH 2004

Another fascinating corner of London which you would have missed without the Guild of Scholars:

The Charterhouse started as a Carthusian Monastery in 1370. In 1611 it became a 'hospital' (for decaying gentlemen) and a school whose illustrious pupils included John Wesley, Sir Robert Baden-Powell, and William Thackeray, who paints a thinly veiled portrait of it in *The Newcomes*. John Carpenter was once a lay brother. A current resident (but not yet very 'decayed') is Alan Scrivener, a former English master at CLSG, who will be our guide. The school has moved to the country but the residences, surrounding mediaeval courtyards reminiscent of an Oxford College, remain housing Charterhouse Pensioners.

We invite you to visit Charterhouse (which is not generally open to the public) for a guided tour. We plan to take tea afterwards at a nearby hostelry. The cost per person for the tour will be £6. The Charterhouse is on Charterhouse Square off Charterhouse Street. Nearest tube - Barbican.

A fuller version, than that in the printed Newsletter, of the obituary for Kenneth Mostyn follows:

Kenneth H Mostyn - Father of the Guild

It is with deep sadness that we advise members of the death of Kenneth Mostyn, Father of the Guild, on 13th December 2003 at the age of 88.

He was educated at the City of London School (1924-34), where his father, Frederick Mostyn CC, became a Governor.

He joined the Honourable Artillery Company in 1938 and was commissioned into the Royal Army Service Corps which he left as a Captain. In WW2 he saw action in the European theatre and was a member of one of the earliest formations to enter Germany after D-Day.

After the War he joined Beal's Ltd where he became a director with special responsibility for the bakery division. After four years he left and bought a hotel business in Blackpool which he ran successfully for many years.

Retiring from the hotel business he moved back to London to a house in Winchmore Hill, and lived there for many years until his death. By his first wife, Irma, he had a son Peter (CLS 1954-64) who, like his father, became a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Bakers. Kenneth married his second wife, Ella Brown, in August 2003. Ella had looked after him for many years.

Kenneth joined the Baker's Company as a Liveryman in 1937, became an Assistant in 1959, and served as Master from November 1972. He was also a Freemason, initiated into the Lodge of the Worshipful Company of Bakers, Laus Deo in 1946, and subsequently that of his old school, the John Carpenter Lodge. His lifetime of service in Freemasonry was recognised when he was made an Officer of the United Grand Lodge of England, an appointment he was proud to accept.

In 1973, during his time as Master of the Baker's Company, Kenneth, together with three other Old Citizens (all now deceased) Jack Diamond, a pre-war Master of the Blacksmith's Company, Bill Grain, a Past Master of the Scriveners Company, and one of the Baldrey brothers, met to discuss the idea that it might be useful to collect together a group of Liverymen who might possibly rekindle their interest in the CLS, the history, present and future of the City of London and, at the same time help other OC's to become Freemen of the City and perhaps Liverymen. A small committee was formed and the most senior Past Master present, Jack Diamond, was elected Chairman. The group would be known as O.C. Liverymen.

Kenneth became chairman of O.C. Liverymen in 1975, a position he held for the next 14 years during which time membership of the group had grown to over 250. His knowledge of Livery Companies and the City was second to none and we all learnt a great deal from him. Besides encouraging OC's to become Freemen, he also introduced a significant number of candidates for the Livery, some of whom today sit on the Court of their Companies.

In 1999 O.C Liverymen became the Guild of Scholars and, in recognition of his commitment and dedication as Chairman of OCL he was unanimously elected by the Court as Father of the Guild, an honour he was both delighted and proud to accept.
