Is our Guild unique?

In our continuing quest, we look at the **Worshipful Company of Mercers**.

As laid down by the Court of Alderman in **1516**, the Mercers rank number 1 in the order of precedence. Their Charters are dated 1394, 1425 and 1559. The original aims were fully religious, social and trade and although the individual members were all merchants the company exercised only moderate control over their activities' There is some **confusion** over the origin of the name **Mercer** which may be derived from the French for merchant or more likely from the trade of 'mercery' itself is first mentioned in the 1130s. This term derives from the Latin *merx*, *mercis*, meaning wares or merchandise.

Famous Masters of the Mercers include **Dick Whittington** (1395, 1401, 1408), **Sir Thomas Gresham** (1569, 1573, 1579) and **Lord Baden-Powell** (1913). Other well known Mercers include **John Colet** and **Henry Howard**, Earl of Northampton).

The records of the Mercers' Company date back to **1348** but the Company is certainly older than this for in that year new ordinances were drawn up for the conduct of its affairs.

The Company's links with the active trade **died out** over the centuries. This was mainly because admission to the Company was mainly possible by **patrimony**. In effect a member could become a member, because his father was a member, without necessarily practising the trade of mercery itself. The other form of admission to the Company was by an eight year **apprenticeship**. Apprenticeship had to be genuine, rather than token, but as links with an active trade declined this became difficult. By the 18th and 19th centuries apprentices were being bound to Masters who were **no longer practising mercers**. No more apprentices were bound after 1888.

Although the Company no longer has any trade to control, its modern life is busy and productive. Through the charitable trusts under its control, the Mercers' Company administers a large programme of **charitable grant making**.

The Company also provides housing for the **elderly**, wide ranging **support** for **education** and has active links with many **churches**.

Congratulations to **Apprentice Charlotte Matthew** (as part of a team from Nottingham University) for reaching the **semi-finals** of the 2007 SIFE (Students in Free Enterprise) **World Cup** competition. Held in New York City and ranking the team as one of **the top 16 in the world**. For an unprecedented 3rd year in a row, SIFE Nottingham won the SIFE **UK National championships 2007**, earning the team a slot at the SIFE World Cup. During this spectacular 3-day event hosted in the Hilton New York, USA, SIFE Nottingham presented the outstanding results the team had achieved this year, focusing on two exceptional projects. Firstly, the "Crocus Café project" saw the team **transform a struggling local business** into a **profitable enterprise** through careful marketing and price modifications. Located in the Church Square Community Shopping centre in Nottingham, the Café has become a thriving focal point of the Nottingham community, recently voted as one of the top 15 vegetarian cafes in the UK by national newspaper, The Observer. Secondly, the team presented their "Beevelop" project which saw students from the University **hosting conferences in Ghana** to improve the current beekeeping practices—a project which has affected one third of the beekeeping industry in Ghana, and seen many beekeepers **triple** their **income** through improved knowledge and practices.
